BAATCHEET SESSIONS

STTI Moderators regularly conduct discussions on various civic issues that are significant in India. These discussions are 1 - 2 hours long.

Some examples include:

- Urbanisation and the Environment
- Adolescent Education
- Disorders and Disabilities
- Gender education
- Stereotypes and Discrimination




These discussions are designed to make students ask questions and expand their understanding of what issues they see around the country. Exercises and activities provide an experiential dimension to each of these issues, and promote core citizenship values. Moderators also organise *guest interactions* and sessions on locally relevant civic issues.


ACTIVITIES



Complementing the sessions, we help students to prepare Assemblies and put up Bulletin Boards. The purpose is to create a platform to showcase their learning, and share it with the larger school community. This is based on Project-Based learning, a defined methodology that promotes 21st Century skills (critical thinking, creativity, collaboration and communication – along with civic engagement.)

For example — After a session on waste management, students may speak in the assembly about the problem, and showcase on the bulletin board how various innovative organisations are solving it. This could be in alignment with academic projects in Environmental Science, Sociology, Political Science, etc.





CHALLENGES

Challenges are designed to motivate students to take action to solve the issues that they see around them – they build empathy, teamwork, creativity and leadership.

Challenges involve two parts: first, a workshop by STTI and a leading organisation to build the skill set that can solve a civic issue, and then doing a Project for students to use these skills and abilities in making a change. The best efforts amongst all STTI Clubs are awarded with certificates and prizes.


MODEL

- We work with students of Classes 8 to 12, who voluntarily join the club, and take up leadership
 positions to coordinate and guide activities. We can work with Class 10 and 12 at the start of the
 academic year, and with other students during the exam months of December April.
- STTI Moderators volunteers who regularly conduct sessions in the school with the interested students. Our moderators come from distinguished colleges and programmes, typically centred around the social sciences and humanities, and are trained in student-centred discussion methods.
- **Teacher coordinators**, who allot and provide dates for sessions, ideally during after-school hours, zero periods, or club activities. They also coordinate permissions for activities such as assemblies, field trips and bulletin boards.

IMPACT

From our short experience, we have seen some very promising impact of the STTI School Clubs. The above data is based on a self-report questionnaire given to students at Delhi Public School, Hyderabad. Many of them shared that they were beginning to make sense of the world outside, and had acquired the skills to question, research, analyse and connect.

Students' feedback: "I feel I have improved my..."



- 1. Encouraged by the response in Hyderabad, we are expanding to leading schools in **Bengaluru**, **Delhi**, **Coimbatore and Pune** in the coming months. These 15 clubs will collaborate with each through the year to form a network of young citizens.
- 2. This is also a way for schools to achieve the aims of classes like **General Studies**, **SUPW**, and **Community Social Responsibility (CSR)**.
- 3. Many **students applying to universities abroad** have taken an active part in the STTI Clubs, as this is an platform to take up initiatives and lead their classmates in various activities.
- 4. Expression from students have come in the form of great writing, media, and projects. We are collaborating with leading platforms and organisations to showcase this student output.
- 5. There is a positive relationship between the students and the STTI Moderators who act as accessible **role models and mentors**. Guests visiting the schools (Eg: Ashoka fellows, renowned artists and college professors, writers) expose students to the different careers they could pursue.
- 6. The learning methods used in STTI are innovative and effective, which focus on building **21st century skills**. Our pedagogy is adopted from the very best in the field: Harvard Graduate School of Education, Project Based-learning from BIE, Stanford d-School, and inquiry-based learning methods from School of ThinQ.
- 7. STTI has been selected as one of the 15 recipients of the <u>Ashoka Youth Venture</u> programme, which recognises it as an impactful social venture driven by the youth.

This is a crucial time in history where everybody has to lead the change, small or big — and education is critical in stepping up to that challenge. Our aim is to create innovative and critical thinkers so they may grow up to be thoughtful and sensitive citizens.
